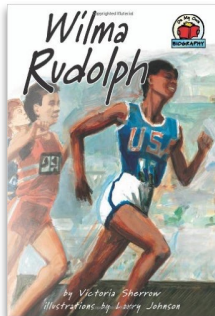
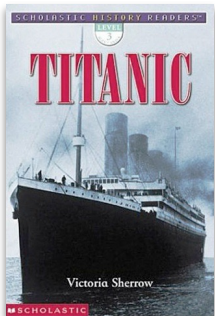

Through the years, her books have earned various honors: *Chipmunk at Hollow Tree Lane* (Smithsonian Backyard Series) Parents Choice Gold Award and Vermont Reading Circle Award; *The Nez Percés* (Millbrook Press) American Association for the Advancement of Science, Best Science Books for Children; *Bioethics and High-Tech Medicine* (Twenty-First Century Books) VOYA Nonfiction Honor Book and Top Ten Selection Kansas State Reading Circle; *Women and the Military* (ABC-CLIO) American Library Association Outstanding Reference Source; *From Smoke to Fire* and *The Blaze Engulfs* (Blackbirch Press) Booklist starred review.

She has received the New York Public Library Books for the Teen Age Award for: *Image and Substance: The Media in U.S. Elections* (Millbrook Press), *Mohandas K. 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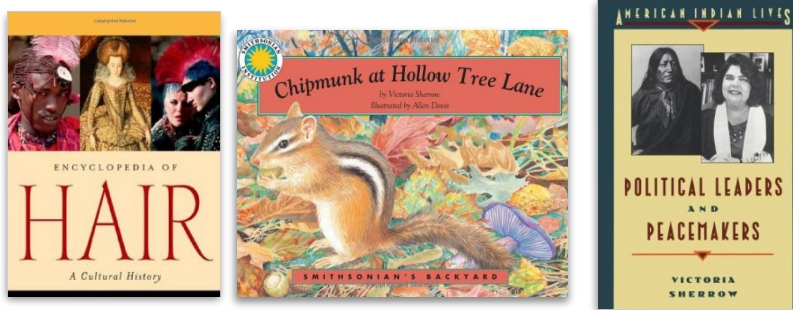

I took plenty of courses in literature, journalism, education, and communication along with my major. In 1979, I began writing for children and made my first sale to *Highlights for Children*. I took courses in children's literature and writing at UCLA and I've been writing full time ever since. One great benefit of my career was sharing my books with my children as they grew up. I still love visiting classrooms to talk about books and writing."

Ms. Sherrow has been teaching at The Institute since 1991.
